## Southeast Asia and Eastern Africa Devastated by Tsunami; Local Community Shows Support

**O**n December 26, 2004, the lives of millions of people were forever changed when a major earthquake and tsunami devastated the coastline of southern Asia and parts of eastern Africa. The American Red Cross quickly mobilized workers to deliver much needed aid to the region. A tremendous outpouring of financial support for the tsunami relief efforts was received from the American public.

As of February 23, 2005 the American Red Cross has raised an estimated \$378.8 million for tsunami relief. This, in addition to the money raised worldwide by the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent societies, we believe is enough money to provide for the immediate and longer-term needs of the tsunami survivors. Worldwide, the Red Cross and Red Crescent movement raised approximately \$1.2 billion to provide aid to the survivors of the tsunami.

### HOW THE MONEY IS USED:

As a good steward of your contribution, the American Red Cross plans to use the money in a two-phase plan to provide for the immediate and longer-term needs of the survivors. The American Red Cross plans to help in the following five areas:

**Food and safe water** - Working in partnership with the World Food Program, the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies and other local and regional partners, the American Red Cross will work to meet the nutrition needs of more than 2 million tsunami-affected people in Sri Lanka, Indonesia and the Maldives over the course of six months. The American Red Cross will also concentrate on restoring water and sanitation systems and providing technical assistance to ensure access to potable water.

**Healthcare and disease prevention** - The American Red Cross, working through the Measles Partnership (UN Foundation, WHO, UNICEF, CDC and the Federation), will support measles control for up to 2 million children through emergency vaccination, outbreak response and a mass campaign for all children under 5 years of age. In addition, there will be a vaccination campaign for approximately 12 million children under 5 years of age and their families which will include other health and disease interventions such as insecticide-treated bed nets for malaria control, polio vaccine, and de-worming medicine. *(Continued on page 2)*

**T**he efforts of the American Red Cross touches our community, our nation and around the world. This has never been more evident than the community involvement brought about by the tsunami tragedy. We continue to respond to local emergencies, deliver transportation to seniors and individuals with disabilities, educate the public on important lifesaving skills, provide assistance to military families and their loved ones serving our country, and deliver blood at critical times of need.

March is designated as Red Cross Month. During this time, we ask you to think about the ways the American Red Cross touches our community, share the good news with friends and acquaintances, and please consider making a financial gift that will provide the resources necessary to continue touching our community.

## Emergency Services

**Immediate family supplies** - American Red Cross support will include the acquisition and distribution of non-relief supplies such as family kits, hygiene kits, kitchen sets and tents. A family kit typically contains plastic sheeting for shelter, sleeping mats and blankets, sheets, mosquito netting, potable water containers and a lantern for a family of six. A hygiene kit typically includes items such as soap, shampoo, toothbrushes, toothpaste, toilet tissue, razors, feminine hygiene products and laundry powder, enough for one family for one month. Families with babies also receive infant-specific supplies. Where needed, kitchen sets can be a part of a family kit or a stand-alone item. They include pots, pans, and plates, bowls and eating utensils. Tents provide temporary shelter for a family of six.

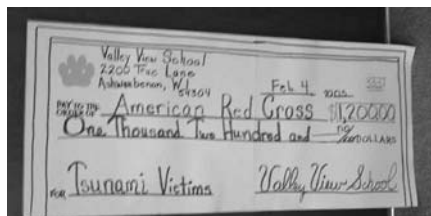
**Mental health counseling** - American Red Cross psychosocial support will include providing psychosocial first aid and a establishing a "train-the-trainer" model to increase the capacity of affected Red Cross Societies and local agencies to provide psychosocial services.

**Disaster preparedness and prevention measures** -The American Red Cross will work to train and inform affected communities in prevention methods in order to reduce the loss of life, livelihoods and property from future natural disasters and build capacity in family reunification.

### **LOCAL SUPPORT**

Through the generosity of many individual donors, businesses and school collections the community of the Lakeland Chapter has raised over \$500,000 for the tsunami relief efforts. "The response towards giving to help the survivors of the devastating tsunami has been tremendous. It again demonstrates the caring of people in this area to help others less fortunate during a time of need," said Steve Maricque.

The process of recovery is a slow one for disaster victims, but the people of Lakeland Chapter have helped provide the resources that will make their recovery possible. You have answered their call for help, letting them know that they are not alone. The work of the Red Cross is possible because of donors like you. We are grateful for your continued support.

# MARCH IS RED CROSS MONTH

## What is the history of Red Cross Month, and why is it significant to our organization?

For the first quarter century of its existence, the Red Cross held no regular fund-raising drives. Since Clara Barton created the organization in 1881, it was largely dependent for publicity and funds on the spontaneous support of people who learned of catastrophic events and the Red Cross response to them. News of an event broke, the American Red Cross rushed to the scene with help, and people around the country came forth with outpourings of volunteer assistance and donations of funds and supplies.

In 1917, after declaring war, President Wilson ordered the American Red Cross to raise funds to support its aid to the military and civilians affected by war, as Congress had mandated. In response, the Red Cross held its first national War Fund drive in June 1917 and set as its goal \$100 million, an astoundingly large sum at the time. The public response was immediate and overwhelming. Within a few days, more than \$115 million was raised. Then in December 1917, the Red Cross held its first "Christmas Roll Call." People were asked to give a minimum of \$1 to join the organization's membership rolls. This drive also proved highly successful, as did an additional War Fund drive and another Roll Call in 1918, the last year of the war.

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In November 1941, with war in Europe, the Red Cross conducted another highly successful Annual Roll Call. A few days later the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor and the United States entered World War II. The Red Cross responded immediately by declaring a War Fund campaign. By June 1942, it had raised more than \$66 million.

The Red Cross decided to cancel its 1942 Roll Call. Instead, after discussions with President Roosevelt, the honorary chairman of the Red Cross, declared the whole month of March 1943 "Red Cross Month."

Every president since Franklin Roosevelt has signed a proclamation declaring "March is Red Cross Month." Across the country we have seen the outpouring of support from the American people in times of disasters, but we need the public to think of their local American Red Cross through out the year to support program and services right here in this community.

The family who lost everything to a house fire, a disabled student that uses transportation services, youth taking the Red Cross babysitting class and community members learning basic first aid. These are the stories and the faces of the people the American Red Cross Lakeland Chapter is helping everyday that don't make the news. ## Blood Services

### New and Improved Donor Process

**B**eginning, March 14, the Badger-Hawkeye Blood Services Region will be implementing changes in our blood donation process at all blood drives and fixed site donor centers.

Donors will still start by signing in and reading through some information about donating blood. Then each donor will have a mini physical checking their iron, temperature, pulse and blood pressure levels. If a donor doesn't meet the requirements, they will be deferred at that point. Those donors who pass all 4 tests will move on to the new universal donor health questionnaire (UDHQ) approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) that will be used at all blood centers throughout the United States. As part of this change, rather than filling out the questionnaire themselves, donors will now meet face-to-face with a nurse. This will enable donors to get immediate answers to any questions they may have. The questions are also simplified and grouped chronologically, helping donors answer more quickly without being confused by the wording or order of the questions.

An expanded, industry-standard medication deferral list will make it easier for donors to answer questions regarding medications they may have been or are currently on, and help nurses better determine if an individual donor is eligible. Also, some donors who are currently ineligible to give blood due to travel and other criteria may become eligible. In addition, tattoos, if received in states where tattoo parlors are regulated, will no longer defer donors from giving blood.

Initially, until donors and staff become more familiar with these changes, the donation process may take a bit longer than in the past. Over time though, these changes will make the process quicker and more convenient for the donor.

# Health and Safety Services

## Prepare for your Child's Spring Training

An injured child is every parent's worst fear, as well as a coach's. That is why the American Red Cross and the United States Olympic Committee have teamed up to develop the newly-revised Sport Safety Training program.

Nationally each year approximately 775,000 children are treated in emergency rooms for sports-related injuries and about 25% of the injuries are serious. Sports Safety Training is designed to help coaches, athletic trainers, parents, and other participants identify and eliminate potentially hazardous situations in various sports, and to recognize emergencies and make appropriate decisions for first aid care.

Sport Safety Training will provide participant's the knowledge and skills necessary for a safe environment. They will also learn to help sustain life and minimize the consequences of injury or sudden illness until medical help arrives. The course teaches individuals the skills and knowledge needed to provide care for victims of sudden cardiac arrest through the safe use of an automated external defibrillator (AED) for both adults and children.

### Sport Safety Training Schedule

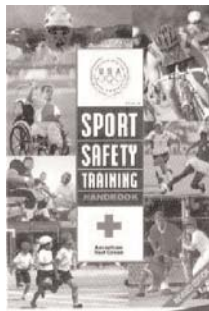
Sport Safety Training is taught by **Leah Ritchie**, Certified Personal Trainer (NSCA-CPT). The first portion of the class certifies participants in CPR/AED for Adult and Child and the second portion is the certification for Sports Injury Prevention and First Aid. The cost of the entire course is \$60.00 per person. If you are already certified in CPR/AED you may register only for the Sports Injury Prevention and First Aid portion for \$50.00.

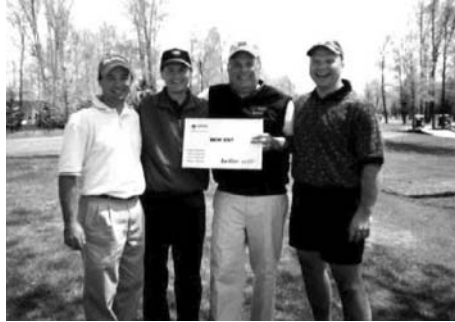
# The 17th annual Lakeland Chapter Golf Classic will be held May 10 at Thornberry Creek Country Club
